Creative Ways to Be in the Word

I was in a meeting recently where a coworker made a comment that you've probably heard before:

There's only so much time in the day.

My coworker was talking about all the different tasks he wanted to accomplish, but he recognized he only had so much time. Despite wanting to get everything on his list done (wouldn't that be nice?), he knew he couldn't. *He had to prioritize*.

You might do something similar—not just at work, but in your everyday life. I know I do. Efficiency demands prioritization. That means making a list and checking things off one by one—whether mentally or physically. The days I don't have a list are when I feel most unproductive (and probably am).

At the end of the day, what absolutely needs to be accomplished . . . and what can wait until tomorrow or get pushed off to an even later date?

Taking that one step further, dear Christian, where does time spent in God's Word place on that list? Please don't misunderstand me—spending time in God's Word isn't something we want to consider an item to check off a todo list, but is it our number one priority . . . or is it one of the many tasks that gets pushed down the list to make way for more time-sensitive things?

You don't have to answer, but to my shame, I know where it can be for me.

The problem isn't a lack of *desire*. As Christians, we want to be in God's Word—where he tells us about our Savior, Jesus. We want to talk to God and we want to be talking about him with our friends and family every day. We want to live out our lives of faith in everything we think, say, and do.

Oftentimes (at least for me), the problem is that I build up spending time in God's Word and growing in my relationship with him to require an hour-and-a-half worship service-styled session . . . and that seems rather intimidating and overwhelming. Not to mention *unmanageable*.

Time spent in God's Word doesn't have to be that way. To be sure, having the right mindset of honor and respect is important when spending time in God's Word—it's not something we do flippantly—but life is busy.

Because there's only so much time in the day, and because spending time with God is important to me, it just means that I might need to be more *creative* in how I go about keeping time in God's Word on that daily priority list.

Here are just a few ideas if you're looking to do the same. Maybe you could:

- Listen to a devotion or a chapter of the Bible
- Talk to God in prayer on the morning or evening commute
- Listen to Christian music at work (if you can do that) or with your kids on the way to and from school
- Ask your kids what they learned in religion class if they go to a Christian school or talk about last week's worship service or children's message with them
- Do an asynchronous Bible study with a friend(s) or family member(s) via text or Bible app
- Talk with your spouse about the worship service or what he or she thought of the sermon or Bible study
- Text your spouse on lunch break about a <u>devotion book</u> or section of the Bible that you're reading through together

Church Council Report from October 21, 2024 Meeting

Pastors' Report

<u>Pastor Zank</u>: Is in the midst of call season. Many pastor and teacher positions in the district need to be filled. Synodical Council is coming up in early November.

<u>Pastor Priewe</u>: Fall Festival was successful, at least 300 trick or treaters plus parents/grandparents. Next weekend Joint Reformation service at FVL, Mount Olive is hosting. Good group for Beginning Instruction Class.

<u>Pastor Gawel</u>: The Parenting workshop had good conversations. Now looking at ways to get that information out in various formats. Valley Teen Night is Nov 3 at Mount Olive, the topic is Christians and politics.

<u>Pastor Raasch</u>: Mount Olive Family Reunion is November 2-4 where the congregation will enjoy worship and fellowship together. Forward in Faith presentation will be given to update our status. Focusing on ministering to those who have been attending only online and reminding the benefits of worshiping together. Asia One Team has called a new leader.

Financial Report

Reviewed September 2024 financial report:

- September offerings were \$11,196 lower than budgeted.
- Tuition was \$16,972 higher than budgeted.
- Other income was \$8,439 lower than budgeted.
- Total income was \$2,663 lower than budgeted.
- Total expenses, before FVL/Synod distributions, were \$21,993 higher than budgeted.
- The net income for September, including FVL/Synod distributions of \$30,100 was \$45,977. This compares to a budgeted net income of \$70,633. The result is \$24,656 unfavorable to budget for the month.

Note: Balance sheet amounts are subject to change pending year-end audit entries.

Reviewed YTD (13 weeks ending September 30, 2024) financial report:

- Offerings are \$6,204 higher than budgeted.
- Total income is \$8,165 higher than budgeted.
- Total expenses are \$9,165 higher than budgeted.
- YTD net income is \$89,732, which compares to the budgeted YTD income of \$90,731. The result is \$999 unfavorable to budget.

Forward in Faith 2 cost tracking update—Operations Manager Paul Kolell reported that:

- Previously informed the group that in the month of September \$20,551 was received in gifts/offerings.
- Previously informed the group that at the end of September there was \$309,921 Forward in Faith funds available (of which \$230,000 has been invested in US Treasury Accounts). After subtracting a reserve for October and January interest/debt payments of \$45,019, there's \$264,902 available for additional debt payments. These funds will accumulate until Bond D is due in April 2025.
- Our net debt remaining (bond debt less funds available) stands at \$1,122,176.
- Banking Update:
- Treasurer Tim Weihing presented the state of our Treasury investments. Currently, we have a total of \$769,176 in Treasury investments. These investments will have two maturities in December 2024, one in January 2025, and one in February 2025.

Other:

- Annual Audit Operations Manager Paul Kolell previously informed the group that CliftonLarsonAllen LLP presented audit findings to our audit team on Friday, October 4. The engagement went very well. Paul will give a summary of the audit to the Church Council at their October 21st meeting.
- Board of Finance Members Chairmen Daryl Ohland informed the group that Derek Kritzer has accepted a nomination to serve on the Board for the 2025-2026 term.
- Tuition Chairmen Daryl Ohland informed the group that the Tuition subcommittee met on October 2nd to discuss tuition rates for the 2025-2026 school year. The subcommittee will provide a recommendation to the Board of Education for final approval.

New Business

- Reviewed board member terms
- 2024 Audit Summary—Reviewed the Audit Summary. A qualified audit report due to the records required for pre-2004 assets. Uncorrected misstatement relating to lease liability, auditing it to not have it in the report would have incurred an additional auditing expense. Efficient process working with auditor. Have been able to close audit earlier and with fewer additional fees than prior years. Improving financial processes has made it go smoother.
- Discuss Growth Design Proposal—The carpet in the narthex and sanctuary needs replacement. That
 perceived need led to a discussion of other possible upgrades to the sanctuary (e.g. better lighting, more
 comfortable seating, including legroom, additional space for musicians, etc.). The Executive Committee
 met with Todd Dvorak of Growth Design Group to see what services they could offer us. The CC reviewed
 a proposal from GDG to help develop plans and models for improving the use and aesthetics of our
 worship space. The CC did not act on the proposal but will seek feedback from the congregation, likely, in
 early 2025. The CC also discussed the current Forward in Faith campaign and how that could impact any
 new project. FIF debt is currently around \$1.1M.
- Ministry Plan Spreadsheet—Review the ministry plan with the boards.



We once again joined hands with Mount Olive SISTERS on October 29th for the Third Annual "Make & Give Night." Watch the December Messenger for news from that evening.



Costa Rica—Valentina's Baptism

Dear Mount Olive Mission Partners,

Last month I had a wonderful visit to a student in Costa Rica. As you may know, from time to time we make personal visits to students in our "virtual classroom" in order to strengthen our Christian friendships.

Let me share a little of that visit with you:

María and Pedro live in San José, Costa Rica. María is originally from the Dominican Republic and Pedro is from Nicaragua but

they have made Costa Rica their home for many years. During the pandemic María began to take classes with us in Academia Cristo. She would usually watch the recordings of the classes on Youtube since their internet connection was so bad she couldn't often connect to the live classes. She and Pedro loved the classes and grew in their faith and understanding of the Bible.

As they advanced in their studies, María and Pedro became enthusiastic ambassadors of their faith, sharing the teachings of Jesus with nearly everyone they met. Their desire to spread the gospel is fueled by their own experiences and the knowledge they gained through their classes.

Recently, they took a big step in their lives by adopting a little girl named Valentina, whose mother had abandoned her. Valentina has become a new focus of their love and faith. During my visit in September, I had the great privilege of encouraging Pedro to baptize Valentina. It was a joyous occasion that encouraged me as I see our leaders whom we are training doing ministry in places I can't be. And another soul was added to God's family!

At The Hope Center, Your Prayers are Needed

It's not easy to admit that you can't take care of basic needs for your family and have to ask for help. This is the ordeal that new clients face when they walk into The Hope Center. The feelings of

failure and desperation are eased by our intake volunteer. These volunteers are experienced, compassionate people, who listen to unhappy stories, reassure of God's love and help, and offer a boost of significant supplies from The Hope Center.

At the intake meeting, new clients also have the chance to meet one of the pastors. Pastors ask gently for personal circumstances and spiritual needs. It's not uncommon, to discover children and adults who haven't been baptized. It's even more common to find souls hurting and struck down, without a personal shepherd or their Good Shepherd. Already at this intake, steps are recommended for following their Savior and being cared for by him. Baptism appointments and dates are scheduled; prayers and future visits are lined up; pastors and volunteers take notes and set up times to follow up.

There are so many to be shepherded. In the last two months, the number of "new" follow-ups needed has grown from the 50's to the 80's. Please continue to support our ministry with donations and consider shadowing to become a volunteer. Pray for workers who can stay in contact and follow up with so many souls without a shepherd.

Ministerial Trust Fund Update

Mount Olive has established a Ministerial Student Trust Fund (scholarship fund) to help support our congregation's young men and women preparing for the public ministry. For the 2024 – 2025 school year, Mount Olive awarded 4 scholarships, totaling \$24,000 to the following members preparing for full-time work in God's Kingdom:

Through Martin Luther College's Congregational Partner Grant program, MLC matched the scholarships, up to \$1450 per full time, traditional undergraduate students. All four of Mount Olive's students qualified for the MLC match.

Income to the Ministerial Student Trust Fund comes from direct contributions and Mount Olive's Endowment Fund – Ministerial Student Fund. Because of the high balance of the Ministerial Student Trust Fund, the distribution from the Endowment Fund was deferred for 2024, allowing the Endowment Fund to stay fully invested.
