

How can I forgive you? October 1, 2017

(Matthew 18:21-35)

²¹ Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" ²² Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.

²³ "Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. ²⁴ As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him. ²⁵ Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt.

²⁶ "The servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' ²⁷ The servant's master took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go.

²⁸ "But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded.

²⁹ "His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.'

³⁰ "But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. ³¹ When the other servants saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed and went and told their master everything that had happened.

³² "Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. ³³ Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' ³⁴ In anger his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed.

³⁵ "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart."

- 1. Agree/Disagree: I am mostly a forgiving person.
- 2. How have you tried to teach your children about forgiveness, or how did your parents teach you about forgiveness?
- 3. The context of Matthew 18 is important. Summarize the beginning of the chapter (the Gospel reading from last week) and explain the connection to this sermon text.
- 4. Agree/Disagree: Peter's question came from a legalistic place hoping to set a limit on forgiveness.
- 5. How do the two amounts owed in the parable help us understand God's forgiveness and also our own?
- 6. How would you respond to the person who felt like forgiving someone gives the impression that what they did was not a big deal?
- 7. In what way is holding onto wrongs committed against us like holding onto a piece of metal with electricity running through it?
- 8. What is the real spiritual danger that comes from failing to forgive others? What is the cure for this?
