- 7. What comfort do you find in vv. 12-13?
- 8. What warning do you find in vv. 12-13?
- 9. In v. 14-15, Paul refers to the Christian's life of sanctification (being set apart for Godly living). What is to characterize the Christian's actions?
- 10. What purpose will the Philippians' lives serve for Paul on the Last Day? (v. 16)
- 11. In v. 17, what point is Paul making with his reference to a drink offering?
- 12. What will you "take home" from this text/sermon?
