God Loves Nobodies: Good News for Somebody Like Me

The title comes from Pastor Matthew Doebler's book published by Northwestern Publishing House in 2022. The book explores those themes listed in the title in a way that convicted me "dead to rights" and also, proclaimed good news in a profound way. What follows is just a short summary of what would be an extremely valuable book to add to your shelf.

Doebler lays out the Somebody Problem this way: Everybody wants to be a somebody. Nobody wants to be a nobody.

"If you believe you are nobody, your thoughts will continually be plagued with worry and desperate plans to become somebody. If you are confident that you are God's somebody, your thoughts will be shaped by peace and humble confidence because your status before God and your future are secure in Jesus. If you believe you are a nobody, you will always be busy seeking yourself. If you are confident that you are God's Somebody, you will be busy serving God and others—especially the nobodies of the world." (p 18-19)

With this framework in mind, Doebler then explores a number of traps and pitfalls that assail us when we think we are nobody and try to become a somebody on our own. One trap is that we try to prove our "somebodyness" before God. If I work hard enough, if I make progress, if I climb up the ladder, if I gain the approval of my peers, if I get better at avoiding sin, if I preach a really good sermon, then I will be "somebody" in God's sight. If you're like me, maybe you thought that as a child of the Lutheran Reformation truths—grace alone, faith alone—that you didn't really struggle with the Roman Catholic idea of doing good works to earn God's favor. Boy, were we wrong! This struggle for approval and acceptance and to be somebody is so much a part of us. This is the natural religion (or the Latin opinion legis) inside of us that thinks we can do something good to present ourselves as somebody good before God, rather than the sinners worthy of condemnation that we are.

Pursuing these desperate plans to become somebody before God fills our lives with pressure, restlessness, exhaustion, and the urge to "live like a parasite on the approval [of others] to build a better name for ourselves" (p 35). This kind of pursuit can also easily lead you into other pitfalls like gossip and scorn for people who don't approve of you. Doebler writes, "Because I felt like a nobody, I thought I could become a somebody at someone else's expense...It secretly make us feel like more of a somebody when another nobody looks bad" (p 80). This kind of behavior turns us all into a bunch of nobodies dragging each other down the mountain while trying to step on each other to get to the top.

What's the good news cure from all this for sinners like you and me? You are Somebody, God's Somebody." God has made you that Somebody. "Now this is what the LORD says—he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you Israel; 'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine" (Isaiah 43:1). And again, "I have engraved you on the palm of my hands" (Isaiah 49:16). And a third time, "You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light" (1 Peter 2:9). "You dear child of God, don't have to prove you are worthy of God's name, because God's righteous name was given to you in Jesus" (p 41).

Life changes so much under this realization. The pressure to perform is gone. Christ gives you his performance. The urge to push others down to lift yourself up doesn't carry the same appeal because of your confidence that Christ has already lifted you up and made you his own. When life's not about proving yourself, think of the time it opens up to serve nobodies and help them realize they are Somebody in Christ.

Church Council Report from February 19, 2024 Meeting

Pastors' Report

<u>Pastor Priewe</u>: Plans for a Seder meal are being finalized by Family Ministry for Palm Sunday between services. This is an opportunity for 7th and 8th graders to serve. Pine car derby is March 3rd.

<u>Pastor Raasch</u>: Busy extending multiple calls to Asia.

Financial Report

Reviewed January 2024 financial report:

- January offerings were \$9,748 higher than budgeted.
- Tuition was \$17,250 lower than budgeted.
- Other income was \$6,475 lower than budgeted.
- Total income was \$13,977 lower than budgeted.
- Total expenses, before FVL/Synod distributions, were \$2,120 higher than budgeted.
- The net loss for January, including FVL/Synod distributions of \$28,400 was \$43,662. This compares to a budgeted net loss of \$27,565. The result is \$16,097 unfavorable to budget for the month.

Reviewed YTD (31 weeks ending January 2024) financial report:

- Offerings are \$19,493 higher than budgeted.
- Total income is \$26,122 lower than budgeted.
- Total expenses are \$22,963 lower than budgeted.
- YTD net loss is \$47,308, which compares to the budgeted YTD loss of \$44,149. The result is \$3,159 unfavorable to budget.

<u>Forward in Faith 2 cost tracking update—Operations Manager Paul Kolell reported that:</u>

- In the month of January \$34,482 was received in gifts/offerings plus \$348 of interest was earned during the month totaling \$34,830 additions for the month.
- At the end of January there was \$167,183 of FIF2 funds available. After subtracting a reserve for April and July interest/debt payments of \$45,149, there's \$122,034 available for additional debt payments.

Banking Update:

- Treasurer Tim Weihing informed the group that the Line of Credit with Nicolet Bank has been renewed. The current Line of Credit balance is \$0.
- Board Member Peter Joch is having communication with Nicolet Bank regarding the reinvestment of the bond that matured on 1/31/24.
- The group agreed to invest \$130,000 of Forward in Faith funding into an additional treasury bond at Nicolet Bank. Board Member Peter Joch will contact Nicolet Bank to create the transaction.

Operations Update:

• Operations Manager Paul Kolell informed the group that templates will be sent to various individuals in March to begin the Fiscal 2025 budgeting process.

Annual Audit:

• The group began discussion on audit firm renewal. Clifton, Larson, Allen will complete their audit contract with Mount Olive after the Fiscal 2024 Financial Audit is completed.

Discussion of decision to invest in a treasury bond versus making an additional payment against the loan, which would also incur a fee. Article coming up in the Messenger to provide a Forward in Faith debt update.

- Call extended to Miss Heidi Moldenhauer to teach middle grades.
- A call for our next principal will be extended on February 26.

Hola! ¿Cómo estás? (Hello! How are you?) Our names are Nathan and Alyssa (nee Stuebs) and we have the privilege of serving on your behalf in our mission to Latin America. We have a special connection to you at Mount Olive because it was Alyssa's home congregation growing up and we were married there last year.

I grew up on the other side of the state (near Wisconsin Dells). I started studying Spanish in high school, but really got into it in college and even took a year off to teach English in the South American country of Peru. In the Seminary, I got opportunities to work in Spanish in Milwaukee, Texas,



and Washington D.C. In 2017, I graduated from the seminary and received the call to be part of the mission team. I lived in Mexico for a year and then have been in Quito, Ecuador since then. Alyssa has jumped wholeheartedly into Spanish and is taking classes here in Quito, making lots of friends along the way. You can find lots of patient and happy people if you just say with a smile, "Estoy aprendiendo español (I'm learning Spanish right now)."

I find great joy working on our Latin American mission team (Academia Cristo—Christ Academy) because I love the philosophy of training everyone for doing ministry—big or small. I love the Bible story of the Samaritan woman because she learned about Jesus and immediately told others what she knew. She certainly kept growing in her faith but she didn't wait to share Jesus with others. She took what she knew and gave it away. That's what we do in Academia Cristo. Train others and encourage them to work in the ripe harvest fields.
